

Judy Atkinson (Professor Emeritus. OAM) is a Jiman (from Central west Queensland) / Bundjalung (Northern New South Wales) woman who also has Anglo-Celtic, and German heritage from her mother. The extensive work she has conducted within Indigenous communities across Australia, in Timor Leste, and in support of Papua New Guinea initiatives, has been in the area of violence, its relational trauma, and healing for Indigenous, and indeed all peoples. She book: *Trauma Trails – Recreating Songlines The transgenerational effects of Trauma in Indigenous Australia*, provides context to the life stories of people who have moved/been moved from their country in a process that has created trauma trails, and the healing that can occur as people make connections with each other and share their stories. In retirement, she is Patron of the We Al-li Trust; and in researching the development of an evidence base using cultural tools in education-as-healing (educaring) in community change processes, in response to historical, social and cultural trauma and recovery.
